HORSE MANAGEMENT ORGANIZER'S UPDATES FROM USPC ANNUAL MEETING

This year the Annual meeting was held in Greenville, SC. It was well attended by the Southwest Region. There was much to see and do, but I tried to stay focused on HM.

I give you a brief synopsis of some of the information given at the HMO seminar. All of these are listed in the Spring HM Newsletter which can be downloaded from the USPC website at: <u>http:/hm.ponyclub.org</u>. It is very important you download the Spring 2009 Newsletter and put it in your HM Rulebook.

1) There is now a job description for the **HM Impartial Observer**. Basically, this is a person who has horse knowledge and an ability to observe situations that occur during a rally. This is purely optional, but would give the competitors someone who will listen to any possible grievances.

2)Attire: In an attempt to standardize the length of shorts at a competition, the committee has developed the 'Fist' Test. This is: The competitor stands up straight and points their fingers to the ground. then makes a fist. To be acceptable, the hem of the shorts should fall at or beyond the end of their fist, no shoulder hunching allowed.

3) **Feed and Feeding**: added- Plastic is not allowed for pre-packaging feed except for the plastic bags specifically made for packaging feed and often used for feed with high fat content (holes for aeration thus releasing humidity and reducing risk of mold/mildew) are allowed.

4) **Water**: Two (2) or more buckets should be hung if necessary to insure that there is an adequate supply of fresh water at all times. In unusual situations, such as the use of a muck bucket for water, the competitor must discuss this with the HM staff

5)Saddlery: Buckle/billet guards are not required on saddles with long billets
6) Required Equipment list: Antibacterial properties will be accepted along with antimicrobial and antiseptic.

- 7) **Saddlery**; Leather tabs on peacock stirrups are recommended but not required
- 8) At rallies, an H-B or C+ will compete as a C2 for their HM
- 9) **Portable music devices** are allowed in the stable area and should be docked to speakers. If ear buds are used, they are allowed only in one ear for safety.
- 10) **Jewelry not permitted**: add- jewelry in any facial piercing: dangling earrings or jewelry of any kind with the exception of Medic alert jewelry.

11) Attire: D rated competitors wearing jodhpurs and paddock boots must wear either knee straps (garters) and/or pant clips.

12) **Longeing**: At the discretion of the CHMJ, any competitor may longe his or her mount directly supervised by a non-competing adult approved by the CHMJ

13) Rope Halters: Should members choose to use rope halters, a hemp twine, or leather loop, tab, or section shall be added to provide a breakaway feature. Halters must fit according to the guidelines found in the HM Rulebook. Training style rope halter are not allowed.

There is to be a new HM Rulebook in 2010.

Medical Armbands At Rallies -

Starting with Championships 2008, Arm Bands which include a current copy of the individual's medical release form, must be worn at all times while on the competition grounds. Starting in 2009, this procedure will be enforced for all regional rallies as well.

Quiz will carry their medical releases in their Name Tag holders or in an armband. Tet will not be required to wear them while actually shooting or swimming, but must have them visible and next to them for these activities and must be wearing them at all other times.

The armbands must be worn on the upper arm. If the competitor has small arms, they may need to safety-pin the armband to their sleeve in the area of the upper arm.

Armbands are available for purchase from the USPC Bookstore.

All officials are encouraged to work with the competitors to remind them of this requirement. Competitors repeatedly found not wearing their armbands could result in a penalty at the discretion of the GJ.

The 2009 Standards of Proficiency are now available and are more explicit in their expectations. I have created a document that illustrates the changes but only in Horse Management. It covers just the D1-C2 standards .

Extra items in kits: Teams may have additional items in their kits as long as they have all the required items and can explain the use of the extra items.

They hope to have guest speakers form time to time. This month they discussed the safety check, bit and bridle fit. Keep up the good work!

It was well attended with 3 full teams consisting of Los Alamos, Watermelon Mountain, Diamondback and Durango competitors.
